

## A List of Existing Live Recordings of Mario Lanza

October 24, 1945: The Celanese Hour: Great Moments in Music (ABC live radio broadcast): Extracts from Puccini's Tosca: Recondita Armonia; Act I Love Duet (abridged) with Jean Tennyson, soprano; E Lucevan le Stelle (Tosca). Sylvan Levin, conductor.

**November 7, 1945**: *The Celanese Hour: Great Moments in Music* (ABC live radio broadcast): "Peace Must Be Won" Victory Loan Program: The House on the Hill (Charles); America the Beautiful (one line only—and he fluffs it!), with Robert Weede, baritone and Vivian Bauer, soprano.

November 14, 1945: The Celanese Hour: Great Moments in Music (ABC live radio broadcast): Extracts from Verdi's Otello: Brindisi (as Cassio) with Robert Weede, baritone; Già nella Notte Densa, with Jean Tennyson, soprano. George Sebastian, conductor.

**December 19, 1945**: Red Barber Review (radio): Vesti la Giubba (from Leoncavallo's Pagliacet); I'm Falling In Love with Someone (Herbert).

**December 26, 1945**: *The Celanese Hour: Great Moments in Music* (ABC live radio broadcast): Extracts from Lehmann's song cycle *In a Persian Garden*: A Jug of Wine, with Frances Yeend, soprano; Ah Moon of My Delight. George Sebastian, conductor.

January 23, 1946: The Celanese Hour. Great Moments in Music (ABC live radio broadcast): Music of Irving Berlin: A Pretty Girl is Like a Melody; All Alone, with Natalie Bodanya, soprano, and Leonard Stokes, baritone; Blue Skies, with Natalie Bodanya. Sylvan Levin, conductor.

**February 6, 1946**: The Celanese Hour: Great Moments in Music (ABC live radio broadcast): Extracts from Romberg's The Student Prince: Serenade; Golden Days, with Robert Weede, baritone; Deep in My Heart, Dear, with Winnie Smith, soprano. Sylvan Levin, conductor.

August 28, 1947: Hollywood Bowl concert. Una Furtiva Lagrima (from Donizetti's L'Elisir d'Amore); Improvviso (from Giordano's Andrea Chénier); E Lucevan le Stelle (from Puccini's Tosca); plus three duets with Frances Yeend, soprano: Parigi, O Cara (from Verdi's La Traviata); Vogliatemi Bene (from Puccini's Madama Butterfly); O Soave Fanciulla (from Puccini's La Bohème). Eugene Ormandy, conductor. "Parigi, O Cara" available for playing in our Audio section.

February 15, 1948: Edgar Bergen Show (NBC Radio): Vesti la Giubba (from Leoncavallo's Pagliacci).

**March 5, 1948**: Concert, Massey Hall, Toronto. La Donna è Mobile (from Verdi's *Rigoletto*); Lamento di Federico (from Cilea's *L'Arlesiana*); Vesti la Giubba (from Leoncavallo's *Pagliacci*). Paul Scherman, conductor. **Lamento di Federico available for playing in our <u>Audio section</u>**.

July 24, 1948: Hollywood Bowl concert. Agnus Dei (Bizet); Nessun Dorma (from Puccini's *Turandot*); Thine Alone (Herbert) with Kathryn Grayson, soprano; O Soave Fanciulla (from Puccini's *La Bohème*) with Kathryn Grayson, soprano. Lanza also appears in Lionel Barrymore's *Halloween Suite*. Miklos Rosza, conductor.

September 15, 1948: Salute to MGM (Radio): Vesti la Giubba (from Leoncavallo's Pagliacci).

September 22, 1948: Salute to MGM (Radio): Thine Alone (Herbert), with Kathryn Grayson, soprano.

**November 25, 1948**: *Elgin Watch Special* (NBC Radio): Cosi Cosa (Kaper-Jurmann); E Lucevan le Stelle (from Puccini's *Tosca*); All Ye Thankful People Come.

**December 19, 1948**: Edgar Bergen Show (NBC Radio): The Lord's Prayer (Malotte).

**August 16, 1949**: Hollywood Bowl concert. E' il Sol dell'Anima...Addio! Adddio! (from Verdi's *Rigoletto*) with Mary Jane Smith, soprano. John Green, conductor. **Performance available for playing in our <u>Audio section</u>**. *Note*: Lanza also sang Celeste Aida (from Verdi's *Aida*) at this concert; this performance has not survived.

September 29, 1949: Screen Guild Theater Program (NBC Radio). I Know, I Know, I Know (Kaper); Mamma Mia, Che Vo' Sape? (Nutile); They Didn't Believe Me (Kern), with Kathryn Grayson, sop.; Veranno a Te sull'Aure (from Donizetti's Lucia di Lammermoor). Henry Russell, conductor.

November 29, 1949: Life with Luigi (radio): Mamma Mia, Che Vo' Sape? (Nutile).

October 28, 1954: Shower of Stars, CBS TV. E Lucevan le Stelle (from Puccini's Tosca); Some Day (from Friml's The Vagabond King). Giacomo Spadoni, conductor. Available for viewing in our Multimedia section.

**November 18, 1957**: London Palladium. *Royal Variety Show*. E Lucevan le Stelle (from Puccini's *Tosca*); The Loveliest Night of the Year (Rosas-Aaronson). Constantine Callinicos, conductor. **"E Lucevan le Stelle" available for playing in our <u>Audio section</u>.** *Note***: Lanza also sang Because You're Mine (Cahn-Brodszky) at this concert; this performance has not survived.** 

**November 24, 1957**: *Sunday Night at the London Palladium*. Because You're Mine (Cahn-Brodszky); E Lucevan le Stelle (from Puccini's *Tosca*); The Loveliest Night of the Year (Rosas-Aaronson). Constantine Callinicos, conductor. **Available for viewing in our** <u>Multimedia section</u>.

January 16, 1958: Concert, Royal Albert Hall, London. Lamento di Federico (from Cilea's L'Arlesiana); Lasciatemi Morire (from Monteverdi's L'Arianna); Già il Sole del Gange (from Scarlatti's L'Honestà negli Amori); Pietà Signore (attributed to Stradella); Tell Me, Oh Blue Blue Sky (Giannini); Bonjour, Ma Belle (Behrend); The House on the Hill (Charles); E Lucevan le Stelle (from Puccini's Tosca); Mamma Mia, Che Vo' Sape? (Nutile); 'A Vucchella (Tosti); Marechiare (Tosti); Softly, As in a Morning Sunrise (Romberg); I'm Falling in Love With Someone (Herbert); Because You're Mine (Cahn-Brodszky); Seven Hills of Rome (Young); La Donna è Mobile (from Verdi's Rigoletto).
